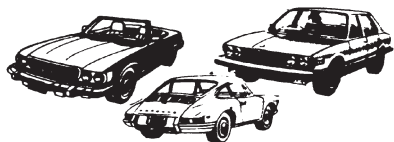

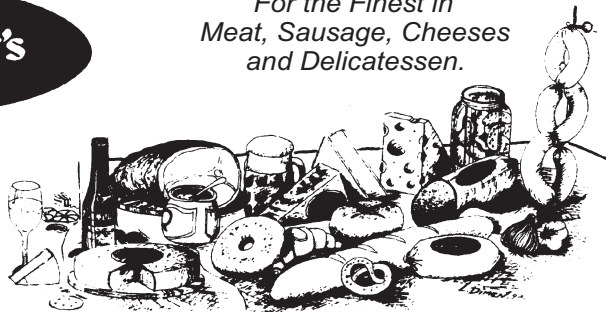

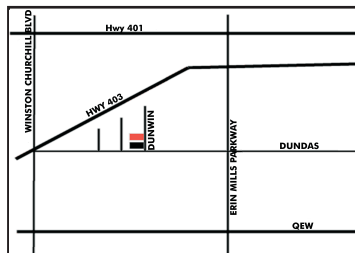

Choral Notes

December 5th was a beautiful day and our concert was very well received. The church was full and the people enjoyed the songs we offered, particularly Mozart's 'Gloria in excelsis' and Handel's 'Halleluja'. Our ladies outdid themselves with several trios presented by Netty DeWitt, Betty Boerkamp, Gertrud Press, Christine Eastwood, Brigitte Muessner, and Hedda Wagenblast. Christine Eastwood and Gertrud Press also sang the solos in 'Panis angelicus' and in 'Oh Holy Night'. The Men's Choir and the Ladies' Choir made their traditional contributions. The arguments in favour of singing in Latin are simple. First of all, the composer – in this case Caesar Franck – chose the text with great care to make a statement that reflected his thoughts. Second, the available translation into English fit the music but deviated from the

original text terribly. So Latin was the best choice. I was surprised when I found out at another concert that Latin is still in use by modern composers who try to make a special statement. There must be something in that language that makes it particularly suitable for such music!

A lot of work went into the preparation for the concert. The patience and never-flagging energy of both Linus and Gertrud Press and of our choristers are commendable, as is the work-behind-the-scene of Ingrid Oppermann with the Little Angels. We appreciate the work of our accompanists Krista Rhodes and Christopher Hunt; we could not do what we did without their support. Our ladies and several of our men must also be thanked for setting up the tables and chairs and serving a reception after the concert. The compliments for the concert and the treats abounded during this fine social time. Following the concert, we enjoyed a fine meal at the Club. Thanks to all organizers, cooks, and service people for giving us a nice relaxed time with fine Christmas music in the background!

- Picnic areas
- Clubhouse
- Trap shooting facility
- Rifle range and hall
- Memorial Garden
- Parking lots
- Campground and service centre
- Rental house for a Groundskeeper

It was clearly the Committee's intention to present the Germania Park as an eventual alternative location to the Club's Headquarter facilities on King Street East. It was keenly aware of the changing demographics of the Club's membership. Frank Bernt, in particular, felt that the desires and needs of those newly arrived immigrants from post-world war 2 Europe were quite different than those of well-established immigrants and their Canadian-born descendants. In his opinion, the former were looking for German-language based cultural and social interaction activities and services while the latter desired English-language based social interaction activities of a recreational and leisure nature. The 1984 master plan attempted to build a bridge for the Club's transition from one generation to the next.

Twenty-six years have passed since the Germania Park's master

plan was submitted to - and endorsed by - the membership. Quite a few of its recommendations have been successfully addressed:

- A nature trail was created
- A modern campground was created, spawning a large and active Campers group
- Picnic areas were established
- A campground service centre and pavilion were constructed
- A Memorial Garden, par excellence, was created and continues to be lovingly maintained
- The rifle range hall has been well maintained and improved
- A lakeside dock has been built
- There is plenty of room for parking.

Close to 100% of the work has been done, free-of-charge, by member-volunteers under the leadership of dedicated Park managers and camping enthusiasts.

However, much remains to be done if the Club wishes to fully implement the provisions of the master plan. One of the many challenges in completing this task is the availability of resources, both financial and personnel. In the context of the Park's 50th anniversary we should remind ourselves that things were not any easier 50 years ago - and yet the Club at that time had the foresight and courage to launch the original Park project!

A former Club President, Albert Perl, once quoted the following lines: (cont'd on pg 11)

The following is a continuation of last month's article of the Park's 50th Anniversary. Enjoy!

Now let's return to 1972: after the dam had been completed and the lake had filled up with water, an awful lot of work was done by a large number of member-volunteers. First off the mark was Karl Kopriva who arranged for the planting of close to 7,000 tree seedlings. This project was heavily subsidized by the Province so the cost to the Club was minimal: \$60 - that is sixty dollars!! Next came the Fishers and Hunters who constructed a state-of-the-art rifle range as well as a large hall with a kitchen, bar and wash-room facilities. They paid for this major project out of their own group's treasury - well, not totally: the Club's Treasurer paid for the water well and some washrooms. Other individuals and groups built wooden picnic service sheds, planted more trees, created a swimmable beach, built parking areas and did general maintenance work. And, again, it was Karl Kopriva who in 1979 arranged and paid for the planting of an oak tree, "eine deutsche Eiche", in memory of the founding members of the "Verein Deutsches Heim 1929", a club of German-speaking immigrants who amalgamated with the Germania Club in 1935.

A few years later in 1982 a plaque inscribed with the names of 34 members of the "Deutsches Heim" was placed near the oak tree in a moving and memorable service. This service was the actual beginning of the annual November

memorial service during which we remember and pray for those Club members who have passed away in the previous year.

Also in 1982 a major milestone was reached as far as the Park is concerned. Eddie Keller proposed the creation of a campground for the Park and wanted to know where to put it. In response, the Board of Directors appointed a Germania Park Planning Committee with the mandate of creating a comprehensive master plan. The six person Committee was chaired by Frank Bernt, a senior Club member and a trained Botanist (University of Guelph) who in his day-time job was the Landscaping Manager in the City of Hamilton Parks Department.

After issuing a number of interim reports, the Committee submitted its final report in the spring of 1984. This report still stands out as one of the best planning documents ever produced in the Club. (A landscape layout drawing and a summary of this report can be found in the May 1984 edition of the Germania Post.)

The main features and recommendations of the report included the creation and/or improvement of a substantial number of facilities:

- Nature trail
- Fitness trail
- Tennis courts
- Children's playground
- Swimming pool
- Lakeside dock and sandy beach
